This year we celebrated a whole International Week (not just a day!) which culminated on the Friday when the children had the opportunity to visit 18 different countries in 30 minutes! International Week embraces the whole school community with more than 40 parents from a variety of countries hosting stalls which every single child visited to listen, taste and experience different cultures.

The stalls included The Lebanon, Switzerland, Israel, Japan, India, Malaysia, Guernsey and Russia to name but a few. Parents dressed in their national dress and offered quizzes, facts, treats and foods for the children to collect and try. Guernsey brought some butter from their Guernsey cows; in Pakistan the children could try some Rooh Afza (a concentrated pink squash) and Japan had some fantastic origami to test their skills.

All the children visited the stalls with a special passport, that needed to be stamped, and a form with questions to fill in. The rest of the day was filled with various workshops which the children showcased at the end of the day in the International Day Parade.

The children from Year 4 learnt about Japan in the Art workshop and



displayed their own Kimonos, Year 5 learnt about Brazil and how to do the Capoeira. Year 3 performed Balinese music which they learnt during their music workshop and the Year 6 learnt dances and songs in Swahili and Spanish, as well as reading French stories to the Nursery children.



"It's a day when we can celebrate our differences and unite in diversity," said Madame Martelli who organised the whole event. "The children love the week and they can learn all about other countries and cultures. It brings together the school community of parents and children showing how we can learn from each other and enrich our lives. We couldn't do this day without all the help from the parents and we would like to say a big thank you to them."

APPLE PRESSING DELICIOUS JUICE ALL ROUND

Every year Chandlings' pupils and staff bring in hundreds of apples and pears from home in order to make juice. The initiative is organised by the school's Eco-Committee and PATCH also help run the apple pressing during the week.

The school hires the apple crusher, apple presser and pasteuriser from a local company, Abingdon Carbon Cutters, who look at different ways of reducing our carbon footprint.



The pressed apples fill hundreds of bottles brought in by the children and are subsequently sold at the end of each day. Each year group from Nursery right through to Year 6 have the opportunity to press the apples.

The proceeds go towards other eco-friendly initiatives that the Eco-Committee have voted for, such as building the school's poly-tunnel for the gardening club that enables the children to grow unusual flowers, fruits and vegetables which need warmer climates.

The environment and climate change are hugely important aspects in our daily school lives. Chandlings' Eco-Committee is at the heart of deciding what areas we need to focus on and how we can reduce, re-use, recycle and ensure that the school is as eco-friendly as



possible. We encourage children to link farming with their food. The apple pressing initiative shows them where apple juice really comes from!

THE MINI PROFESSOR VISITS NURSERY SHAPES, TEXTURES AND COLOURS

All the children in Nursery were delighted to see Lucy from The Mini Professor. They all donned their white coats and learnt all about 2D and 3D shapes, textures and colours. The children, just like real scientists, had to discover and hunt for different shapes such as spheres, columns and cubes. They held sandpaper shapes, learnt about rough and smooth textures and then turned the shapes rough side up and made shape rubbings. The day ended with the Shape story and singing a variety of shape songs.

They answered three rounds of tricky questions and had to sprint to the marker with each answer before being given the next problem. Fast, frantic and fun! The boys worked in pairs and showed great focus and teamwork.

We were delighted that out of 57 pairs, Etai and William came 3rd and Lakshay and Kai came 14th.



On 12th November many of our Year 5 and Year 6 children sat the Primary Maths Challenge at Chandlings. This is a national competition which requires both logic and 'thinking outside the box' to solve problems. A really good mental workout. All children tackled the challenge with enthusiasm and confidence. We were very proud to present 14 Bronze certificates, 8 Silver and 5 Gold certificates in Assembly. Well done!

The Gold certificate winners - Guy, Joseph, William, Etai and Josh did exceptionally well and will be taking part in the Bonus round early next year. This is great achievement!

PRE-PREP SPORT

In outdoor lessons Pre-Prep children have developed their A, B, C's agility, balance and coordination through individual challenges and small sided games. Whether throwing, catching, kicking or hitting balls of all shapes and sizes, their playful experiences culminate in producing a well rounded child with a broad base of abilities. Some of the team challenges require thought and promote an enquiring mind

whilst others are simple races which bring out their competitive spirit.

Indoors gymnastics is always a popular lesson as the children build upon their natural desire to move and balance. Whenever possible they use the apparatus and ropes to gleefully climb up, balance on, jump from, slide up and down or simply hang and swing. They create their own sequences and work together to synchronise and coordinate their movements.



GIRLS' HOCKEY GOING FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

All girls in the Prep department enjoyed a full term of Hockey which featured a busy and challenging fixture list. In Year 3 the focus has been on basic passing and dribbling techniques. They played 5 a side against schools such as Cokethorpe, Rupert House and Beachborough and developed their ability to perform basic skills under pressure.

In Year 4, girls began to play the full 7-a-side version of the game with the A team even experiencing play with a goalkeeper. In an exceptionally encouraging season, the U9 teams recorded notable victories against The Manor, Swanbourne, Beachborough and Rupert House as well as a first place finish at the Yateley Manor tournament for the A team. All players have shown a tremendous amount of promise in the sport and an enthusiasm which has led to many joining external Hockey Clubs.



The girls in Year 5 and Year 6 benefited from training sessions at Tilsley Park twice a week this term. Working as one squad, the girls

pushed each other to improve the speed of their decision making and confidence when under pressure. Specific goalkeeper training was also provided to a number of the players and all girls in Year 6 had the chance to 'kit up' and have fun diving around saving goals. In fixtures against Akeley Wood, Beachborough and Swanbourne, the U10 and U11 teams recorded wins across the board. At the Yateley Manor and Cokethorpe U11 tournaments, teams which combined Year 5 and Year 6 players together finished a highly commendable 2nd overall.

The squad performed well at the U11 IAPS qualifier and grew throughout the day as a team. There were plenty of encouraging signs for both this season and the seasons ahead.



BOYS' RUGBY PROUD COACHES ALL ROUND

The boys have played a high standard of rugby this term whether they were starting out playing Tag Rugby in Year 3 or playing in the U11 A and B teams who were unbeaten over 7 games at the Cheltenham Prep festival.

Rugby is safely introduced during games lessons by some of the most experienced staff in the area with Mr Boyle and Mr Brodley being Directors of Rugby at Oxford Harlequins and Oxford



Rugby Clubs. We give emphasis to playing games rather than just skills and drills so the boys have maximum fun whilst learning.

Inter-school competition, where everyone is included, is an important cog in their cycle of learning and a barometer to indicate their ability. In accordance with RFU protocol, results do not lead to trophies but it was obvious that Chandlings were one of the leading schools.

The Year 3's won far more games than they lost throughout the term, including a clean sweep at the Abingdon Prep Festival. Year

4 were mightily impressive whilst Year 5 looked good in front of the Abingdon Senior school staff by winning every game they played at their festival.

Year 6 were strong across all teams as the D's were unbeaten in a triangular against Claire's Court and Moulsoford and in their final festival for Chandlings the A and B's went into the heartland of the west country and were victorious against Clifton College, St John's Chepstow, Hereford and Dean Close. They epitomise Chandlings children - so humble in victory and gracious in defeat.



NURSERY PE AND SWIMMING SOMERSAULTS AND SPLASHES

All children in Nursery have once again made the most of their Physical Development opportunities. In twice weekly PE lessons, pupils developed their fundamental movement skills; travelling over, under and around objects. PE lessons have also developed children's specific skills such as forward rolls and balancing. For those that ventured into the water with Mr Brooks, weekly swimming lessons helped to build their water confidence with children

able to jump into the water and some growing more comfortable with being fully submerged.





WE DECLARE THE POLY-TUNNEL OPEN GET READY FOR GIANT VEGETABLES

It's not often that a school gets the garden shears out to cut the ribbon but Ms. Cook donned her wellies and coat in order to declare the new Chandlings Polytunnel open. The polytunnel, situated in the school's Eco-field, has been planned by the Eco-committee and the Gardening club over the past year and built by Mr Maskrey and his team. On Monday 5 November, the raised beds and irrigation system were finally in situ, to allow little hands to begin planting seeds.

The polytunnel was funded from a variety of initiatives organised by the Eco-committee including the proceeds of the annual apple pressing and juicing, as well as the selling of products such as bird



boxes made at school and sold at the school Christmas Bazaar.

Chandlings' Garden Club, which will be the main beneficiary of the new polytunnel, is a year round activity which seeks to promote a love of gardening and increases pupils' awareness of ecology, botany, and conservation. Children learn how to save and sow seeds, nurture plants and discover when and how to grow their favourite foods. Mrs Newman, head of the Gardening club said,

"We are so excited about the brand new polytunnel and its automatic sprinkler system. We can now try and grow more interesting plants such as chilli peppers or giant tomatoes and carrots, and our gardeners can directly compare the difference between what we can grow in the polytunnel and what grows in the outdoor allotment. It also means that on rainy days we don't have to get wet in the school allotment!"

SPOTLIGHT ON POTTERY

Pottery club is a very popular activity for Year 1 and Year 2. This term the children have been learning to work with red terracotta clay and white Thomas clay for smaller projects. The techniques they have learnt have been hand building, rolling and a folding technique using a wooden roller and using simple tools to mould

clay surface. They also learnt how to use glazes and oxides safely and how to achieve a shiny finish.
